

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The Maverick Bull is the monthly newsletter of The Maverick Grotto, an internal organization of The National Speleological Society (NSS G-322). The editor invites all individuals and other grottos to submit articles, news, maps, cartoons, art and photographs. If the material is to be returned, a self-addressed stamped envelope should accompany it.

Reprinting Articles: Internal organizations of The National Speleological Society may reprint any item (unless copyrights belong to the author as stated in the byline) first appearing in *The Maverick Bull* if proper credit is given and a complete copy of the publication is delivered to the editor at the time of publication. Other organizations should contact the editor of *The Maverick Bull* at the address herein.

Exchanges: The Maverick Grotto will exchange newsletters with other grottos and caving organizations. Contact the editor.

Complementary Newsletters: The Maverick Grotto will provide complementary newsletters to persons or organizations that provide cave access (i.e. landowners) or otherwise provide assistance to cavers. The Maverick Grotto will provide one free issue to persons interested in becoming members.

Subscription Rates: Subscription rates are \$15.00 per year for non-members and free for members.

Membership Policy: Any individual with interests, beliefs and actions consistent with the purposes of The Maverick Grotto and The National Speleological Society is eligible for membership. Acceptance of new members is based on payment of dues and a mandatory three trip requirement with at least three different grotto members. These three members shall act as sponsors. At least one sponsor must attend the meeting at which the membership vote is taken. A two-thirds majority vote of the members present will be required for acceptance.

Meetings: Regular meetings are held the second Tuesday of each month at Smokey's Ribs, 5300 E. Lancaster, Fort Worth. It is located less than one mile west of Loop 820 and next to K-Mart. The time is 7:00 p.m., and the food is good.

Gunnar Brune's *Springs of Texas* Available in Reprint

Save Barton Creek Association and Ecological Recovery Foundation proudly announce the new second edition of ***Springs of Texas, Volume I by Gunnar Brune*** (deceased 1995). This is the classic reference work on Texas springs. First published in 1981, this 566-page book has been lost to the Texas community for years. In his work, Gunnar Brune documented the history, archeology, ecology, hydrology, and geology of approximately 1,800 springs in 183 counties of Texas. Nine maps show the springs' locations, aquifers, mineral springs, and early trails associated with the springs. Numerous photographs document the author's research. A new introduction to the book updates the environmental status of springs, discusses current water law, and lists endangered species now known to occupy springs habitat. The second edition is being published by Texas A&M University Press and will be available in May 2002.

(During the March Maverick Grotto meeting a discussion began concerning whether the club should use some of the financial surplus that has accumulated to purchase caving equipment. Dave was asked to submit a list of items he deemed appropriate for consideration as a way to stimulate discussion on this topic. Here is the list he put together. Please note that this topic has been raised in the past and was not approved. Please consider if this is something you would be in favor of having your grotto dues spent on. RD)

Here's a starter list of gear that I believe the Grotto should have on hand to support all trainees:

Guide to Responsible Caving pamphlets
Helmets
Headlamps with mounting attachments
Kneepads
Elbow pads

Trainee support for caves with simple vertical elements (such as Wind and Christmas Tree):
Seat harnesses with quicklinks

Group support for all caving:
First aid kits
Walkie-talkies

Group support for caves with simple vertical elements:
Etrier
Cable ladder
Stitch plate
8 or 9 mm dynamic hand/belay line
perhaps some long pieces of webbing and locking bieners

I suppose group support for vertical caves or for surveying could be discussed but let's just get things started here.

Three Skylight Cave

On April 14, 2001, cavers from around the state formed their crews and set out to find, explore, and survey caves. On this morning Rafal Kedzierski, Craig Bittinger, Carson Sloan, Will Harris, R.D. Milhollin, Wayne Peplinski, and myself made up our crew. Our goal was to cross the river and survey caves we had discovered back in February. Then we would look for other caves.

Once at the river, the water was at a normal level and the crossing was uneventful. Other crossings were not so uneventful when rubber rafts had been used. If not inflated fully they would fold and fill with water in the strong currents caused by recent rains. None ever sunk but many got wet. We were headed to CB 11 and CB 12 to survey. Both caves were vertical with four survey shots done at the bottom of CB 11, now known as Fenceline Frog Fissure. We ended up with 105 ft. surveyed. As these caves were now surveyed and sketched, we broke up into two groups and went looking for other caves.

After a short time, RD and his group found a carst area with a cave and tagged it CB 14. Our group looked down the hole and then continued to follow the dry streambed down to the NE. After a short distance of about 200 yards, we discovered a sink with a crevice leading to the North along the bottom. Along this crevice were three more openings to the surface, and under the last opening was a pit going down for about 35 ft.

A rope was rigged, and Wayne went down first, and I followed. At the bottom, a passage about 4 ft. wide and 2 ft. tall went on to the North. Wayne dropped to his belly and began to crawl. I got down and followed. I crawled only about 15 ft., but Wayne crawled out of sight. This was a nasty crawl through tight squeezes, over rocks, and debris. Wayne had crawled about 100 ft. and told me it kept going. Wow, we had found a cave that goes! We all decided not to explore any further this day, but we did survey and sketch the entrance crevice and the pit. Today's survey covered about 100 ft. It was getting a little late, so we headed back towards the river to cross and on the way back we stopped to get RD and his group. Back at camp we talked about our discoveries and began to make plans for a return trip.

I began to learn to survey and sketch. I wanted to draw a map of this cave.

On November 10, 2001 we made our second survey trip to CB 15, now known as Three Skylight Cave. Early this Saturday morning I was up and trying to find out who wanted to survey a cave. Terry Holsinger had asked who was in my group, but not everyone was at camp yet. At 9:30 Rafal and a lady friend, Lee, showed up. Wayne said that he would go. I then asked Eddie Baker to go. Our group was set: Rafal, Lee, Wayne, Eddie, and myself. I let Terry know as we packed up and left for the river crossing.

At the river, we unloaded my two kayaks and made our way across the river and along the trail to our cave. We followed the path along the fence to CB 12; we then followed the dry streambed to CB 14- Carlsbad Connection, stopped, looked down the hole, then continued on to Three Skylight Cave. Wayne took the lead, and we soon found

the cave. Wayne went ahead and chimneyed down the pit while I rigged a rope for the rest of us. After the removal of a rattlesnake from the pit, all of us, with the exception of Lee who stayed up top, repelled down so we could begin our survey.

This was my first time to sketch, so Rafal and I discussed what I should try to draw. We set our stations and began to survey.

This day we shot only 9 stations. We had surveyed and sketched 110 ft. of cave. We agreed that the sketch was accurate and it seemed easy for me, but I was slow. We had been in the cave for 4½ hours, but the cave was low, which made it unpleasant to survey. We hoped that it might open up soon.

On our trip back to the river, Wayne had his bout with dehydration and we assisted him the rest of the way to the river. Then the ambulance, the helicopter, well, a long story unfolded as the cave had claimed its first victim. Would there be more?

Back at camp with a change of clothes and something to eat I felt better, but our concern for Wayne prevailed. We packed up his gear and hoped for the best. Later the next morning we found out, after a phone call, that he was OK. We learned he had called his wife to rescue him. Later that night, after my return home, I had called Wayne to check and see if he was OK. A true blue caver, he asked, "When are you going back?"

Our next trip to Three Skylight Cave was December 8, 2001. We drove down after work Friday and arrived with a light rain falling. The rain was supposed to be over before morning.

Saturday morning came and a group was organized for a return survey trip. Grace Borengasser, Rebecca O'Daniel, Scott Serur, and myself left our camp at 9:40. Arriving at the river, we quickly got the kayaks ready, crossed the river, and left for Three Skylight Cave. We found the cave with no problem. I rigged the rope, then Rebecca went down first. I followed with Grace and Scott behind me. We all crawled the 114' ft. to our last survey station. We had begun to survey when Rebecca told me she wasn't feeling well. Just a little upset stomach. I wondered if the cave was jinxed. Rebecca laid down in the passage while the rest of us surveyed.

We only surveyed a few hours because we were concerned about Rebecca being sick and an overcast sky looming outside. But we did manage to get four stations and 53' ft. of new cave sketched. We also discovered two high ceilings where the low passage opened into a tall crevice with formations all across the ceiling the length of the passage. These high ceilings still need to be checked out. "Maybe our next trip back we might check them out!" Back at camp the cavers gathered at the fire as more cave stories were shared, comparisons made, and cave discoveries announced.

My next trip to Three Skylight Cave was February 9, 2002. I was crossing the river with James Lawrence, Eli Hernandez, Paul Trowbridge, Bryan Trowbridge, and my-


self. Arriving at the cave a rope was rigged and I dropped in first. I quickly discovered that the passage was flooded about 18" deep. I decided that no one needed to suffer hypothermia and called off the survey. So this month we just went ridge walking and back to Half Hill Cave so my buds could see it. An hour later, we were headed to Carlsbad Connection, when we walked up on a cave in a wide crevice. The cave was explored to a depth of 15'ft. The passage entering the cave was 2' wide by 18" tall. This, after 10 ft., opened into a 35'x20'x2' room that sloped to the S.E. and drained through a small hole alongside a solid bedrock wall. We dug at this point, but nothing opened up. A few bats were seen, so we left the cave. We named it Sangria Cave. Then on to Carlsbad Connection. Finding the cave, all five of us dropped down to the first level, then on down to the second, then the third. Each level was well decorated with many formations. After enjoying the cave, we all made the difficult climb out and headed back to camp. At camp, dinner was fixed, eaten, and then on to the warm fire for libations and talk about the day's caving. In another month

we would return.


On March 9, 2002 Rafal, Rebecca, and I did return to Three Skylight Cave to survey. We three dropped the pit for the tortuous crawl to our last survey station, 15. At station 15, the cave became very narrow. Rebecca and Rafal had to get on their sides to crawl through. We shot the first two stations before I needed to crawl through. When I tried to squeeze through, I could not fit, so I gave the book to Rafal. They surveyed while I dug out the floor beneath the crevice so I could come up from underneath where the crevice opened up a little wider. I dug for one and half-hours before I could fit through. A few more stations were shot, the data recorded and sketches were drawn. The last 40 ft. were difficult because the ceiling here was very low. At station 23 we called it a day. We had, with great difficulty, surveyed another 76.9 ft. The total length of the cave is now 362 ft!

We don't have any plans to survey this cave anytime soon, but I will get back to it someday. Hope you find yourself underground sometime soon!

Newest Version of the Maverick Grotto Constitution

Recent events involving offices in the Maverick have prompted a review and updating process to fine-tune the rules our club is governed by. Input from current as well as past officers was heard, as well as several members who contributed input during the April grotto meeting. A few last-minute items were placed before the membership at that meeting, and votes were taken on the form the final draft would assume. The new Maverick Grotto Constitution is printed below for the use of members, and for the intellectual curiosity of prospective members or anyone else. One of the

results of the changes is that we will need to elect a newsletter editor at the upcoming meeting in May. We will take nominations and vote in the same meeting, so if you don't want to be elected you had better attend. The temporary guest editor would like to thank the following for their input in the process of updating the document: Michael Anderson, Chad Fenner, Butch Fralia, and Ed Goff. We ask that the members look over the new Constitution and keep a copy for future reference.

Constitution of the Maverick Grotto of the National Speleological Society

- II. The name of this organization shall be the MAVERICK GROTTTO of the National Speleological Society.
- II. The purpose of the MAVERICK GROTTTO shall be, as a non-profit organization, to further discovery, exploration, survey, scientific study, conservation, and human relations as related to the field of speleology. Additionally, safe caving techniques and positive landowner relations will be promoted.
- III. Any caver whose interests, beliefs, and actions are consistent with the purposes of the MAVERICK GROTTTO and the National Speleological Society is eligible for membership. Membership in the National Speleological Society is encouraged, but is not required except to hold grotto office. Acceptance of new regular, family, or associate members shall be by payment of dues and by a two-thirds vote of the grotto membership present at a regular monthly meeting, after a three trip requirement with at least three different grotto members has been met (must be three separate caving trips; multiple caves visited on a single trip may not be counted). These three members shall act as sponsors, and one must be present at the time of voting.
- IV. Honorary membership may be bestowed upon individuals as an honor by a three-fourths majority vote of the grotto members present at a regular monthly meeting.
- V. Associate members may not vote or hold elected or appointed office in the grotto. Otherwise, the requirements and privileges are identical to those of regular membership. Family members shall be those members residing with a regular member.
- VI. Revocation of membership for valid reasons may occur by a three-fourths majority vote of members present at a regular monthly meeting, provided such member is advised in writing by the grotto secretary at least twenty days in advance of the meeting that such action has been included upon the agenda, along with the reason for the proposed revocation. A membership continuing from the previous year will automatically lapse if annual dues have not been paid by the April meeting.

VII. Maverick Grotto Officers

- A. The elected officers of the grotto shall be Chairperson, Vice-Chairperson, Secretary, Editor, and Treasurer. They shall be elected in that order at the regular monthly meeting in November, and take office on 01 January of the following year. The chair and vice chair shall serve a maximum of three consecutive years in either or both offices.
- B. The Executive Committee shall consist of all elected officers of the MAVERICK GROTTTO.
- C. The Chairperson will preside at grotto functions, delegate authority, and appoint committee chairpersons.
- D. The Vice-Chairperson will function as the meeting program manager, in addition to presiding at grotto functions in the absence of the Chairperson.
- E. The Secretary shall record minutes of the grotto functions, maintain all non-financial records, and provide the minutes to the editor for publication in the monthly newsletter.
- F. The Editor shall be responsible for producing and mailing a monthly newsletter for the benefit of grotto members and subscribers.
- G. The Treasurer shall keep accurate records of membership dues, newsletter subscriptions, and grotto expenses, as well as maintain an up-to-date list of all members and subscribers. This list shall be published annually in the May newsletter.
- H. All elected officers must be current members of the National Speleological Society and must list the Maverick Grotto as their primary grotto affiliation.
- I. Elected or appointed officers may be removed by a three-fourths vote of members present at any regular monthly meeting.
- J. In the event an officer resigns or is removed from office, a special election will be held. Nominations and voting will take place at the next grotto meeting after publication of an announcement in the newsletter. The Chairperson may appoint a volunteer to perform the duties of the vacated office until the special election is held. If the office of Chairperson is vacated, the Vice-Chairperson will act as temporary Chairperson.

VIII. Official Meetings

- A. Regular grotto meetings shall be held monthly on a consistent date publicized in the grotto newsletter. The December meeting may be held as a grotto Christmas party. The regular meetings will be held in Tarrant County, Texas except when a member or members in an outlying area wishes to sponsor a meeting. Such outlying meetings will be subject to the majority approval of the Executive Committee and shall be publicized in the preceding month's grotto newsletter.
- B. Special meetings may be called when ten or more grotto members make a request in writing to the Chairperson. Notice of the meeting including agenda shall be mailed to the address of all current members seven days prior to such meeting, and only items on the publicized agenda may be considered at such meeting.

IX. The following volunteer positions may be appointed by the Executive Committee: librarian, webmaster, and quartermaster.

X. Amendments to the Constitution and/or Bylaws may be approved by a vote of two-thirds of the members present at an official meeting, provided the proposed amendment is presented in writing and read to the membership in a previous meeting, and has been published in full in the previous month's newsletter.

BYLAWS

1. A quorum for a meeting shall include one elected officer, and five voting members or one-fourth of the regular membership, whichever is the larger number.
2. For any and all voting situations a quorum must be present.
3. All members including honorary members and family members age fourteen and over shall have one vote. Unless otherwise specified in the Constitution or Bylaws, any motion approved by a majority of a quorum shall be passed.
4. Associate members shall include family members under the age of fourteen.
5. At the last regularly scheduled meeting of each year, dues for each category of membership (regular, family, associate) and subscription fees shall be set by a majority vote.
6. Dues for one calendar year shall be payable by the April meeting to the grotto treasurer. Only new member dues may be prorated for the balance of the year.
7. A subscription payment for one year's newsletter may be credited toward that year's membership dues, if the subscriber should be voted in as a member. Subscription shall not imply or constitute membership in any form.
8. The Executive Committee shall offer recommendations and place items of business on the regular meeting agenda, but may not take final actions not specifically provided for in the Constitution or Bylaws, or delegated by the voting membership. The Executive Committee may appoint chairpersons of other committees with similar rights and limitations.
9. The grotto newsletter will be a membership communication instrument with monthly circulation designed to also provide timely notice of grotto business. It will maintain a neutral, non-political atmosphere and publish in the following priorities: meeting notice, calendar of upcoming events, meeting minutes, important legal, environmental, and conservation items of area interest, trip reports, and general items of interest.
10. In the event of dissolution, any property of the grotto shall be sold at auction, with monies raised going to the National Speleological Society. Any property of the National Speleological Society shall be returned at that time.
