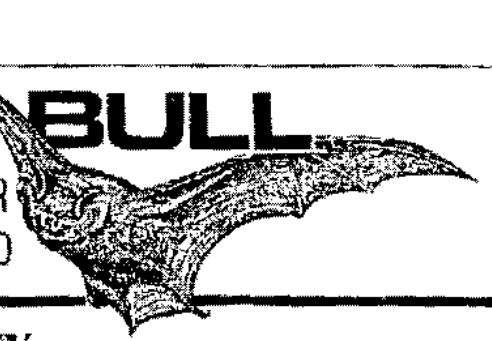

COMPLIMENTARY NEWSLETTERS: THE MAVERICK GROTTO will provide complimentary newsletters to persons or organizations who provide cave access (i.e. landowners) or otherwise provide assistance to cavers. THE MAVERICK GROTTO will also provide three free issues to persons interested in becoming members.

MEMBERSHIP POLICY: Any individual with interests, beliefs, and actions consistent with the purposes of THE MAVERICK GROTTO and the National Speleological Society is eligible for membership. Acceptance of new members is based on payment of dues and a mandatory three trip requirement with at least three different grotto members. These three members shall act as sponsors. At least one sponsor must attend the meeting at which the membership vote is taken. A two-thirds majority vote of the members present will be required for acceptance.

## Raised Relief Maps

I recently came across a source for raised relief topographic maps and thought I would pass along the information. The name of the company is Hubbard and they produce reasonably priced high quality maps available framed or unframed. They use a standard U. S. Geological Survey map as a base (Scale= 1:250,000) and print it on durable plastic which is then molded into a three dimensional representation of the topographic relief. This accurate scale model gives an immediate impression of the terrain and shows all of the standard symbols of a U.S.G.S. map including contour lines, elevations, woodlands, lakes and streams as well as cultural features such as railroads, airports, county boundaries and population centers. The vertical scale is exaggerated to give a greater impression of relief.

They are available as regional maps of the mountainous areas of the United States including many popular caving locals. These maps cover nearly the entire western U.S. from the 104<sup>th</sup> West longitude line all the way to the coast. This includes the Guadalupe Mountains north of the Texas-New Mexico border. Hawaii is available but Alaska is not. Maps of the eastern U.S. cover a wide area of land from the T.A.G. country (Tennessee, Alabama, Georgia) to Maine. The entire midsection of the U.S. is omitted, presumably because there is not enough verticle relief present there to make an interesting map. This, unfortunately, leaves out the Ozarks and Arbuckles as well as all of Texas.

Most maps cover an area of two degrees longitude and one degree latitude (approximately 110 miles X 70 miles). The verticle exaggeration is 2:1 for areas of the Western U.S. and 3:1 for the Eastern parts. The average size of the individual regional maps is 21 inches by 31 inches. Unframed maps cost \$15.95 apiece and are also available framed in solid oak for \$37.95.

Additionally, Hubbard produces raised relief maps of selected National Parks. These include the Great Smoky Mts., Rocky Mts., Yosemite and Yellowstone Parks as well as Glacier, Olympic, King's Canyon/Sequoia and others. Depending on the park selected, these maps measure either 12½" x 18½" or 25" x 18½" and each includes the entire park boundaries. These are available unframed for \$4.95 and \$7.95. They are also sold framed in solid oak and mounted with a two-tone matte precut with spaces to allow you to display your souvenir photos and postcards of the area. These cost \$19.95 and \$25.95.

This company also sells the raised relief geo-political maps of the U.S. and the world commonly seen in classrooms.

## TICKS & TAPE

OK, as promised in the last issue of the Maverick Bull, I included a small humorous glitch about removing seed ticks with the all too useful, DUCK TAPE. From the Missouri Speleological Survey's MSS LIAISON, A seasonal ranger told some Missouri cavers that the best way to remove them was with DUCK TAPE. The tape will not tear the hair off your legs but it does effectively remove the seed ticks.

Well, that was the exciting glitch about DUCK TAPE and seed ticks. Being the aggressive Editor/Chairman that I am, I thought I would make a little test. First, I managed to get a friend of mine to collect some of the smallest ticks that he could find. (He lives out in the country.) Besides, his dog didn't seem to mind giving up 50 or 60 for research.

Now, with ticks in a little container (with some holes cut in the top for ventilation) and my roll of Duck Tape, I headed to the bathroom. I had a pull-over type T-shirt on that said, "DISINFECTED" so I slipped it off over my head. Next, I removed my Colorado brand tennis shoes followed by socks and a few small balls of lint stuck to the bottom of my feet. I can only assume that your waiting for me to say that the next item to be removed would be my jeans. OK-I slid those down and stepped out. I stepped into the shower (to help corral the fugitive ticks) bent over removed the lid from the container, gritted my teeth, and dumped those little boogers in an area of a LARGE stalagmite and sink hole. Duck Tape handy, I pull off a strip about 2 feet long and using a blotting action, I managed to stick two or three. If your hairy, do not blot with the tape and then start to buff back and forth like buffing for a high luster on boots as this technique entangles hair rapidly. Duck Tape isn't like a pair of bad underwear that creeps up when movement becomes necessary, Duck Tape digs in deeper with a very authoritative grip to it. 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In the May 13th issue of the Bexar Facts, our caving friend, Oren Tranbarger has included a recipe for in cave chow. I personally haven't tried it yet but my test kitchen is still being set up at this time. In the mean time you may try this Hardtack mixture. Over the weekend, Memorial, I set and ate Craker Jacks by candle light in of all places, Virgin Cave, Guads. Oren says that this recipe was printed in the August 1979 issue of the Texas Highways magazine. He has tried it (the recipe) and recommends it. Here it is:

| 2 Cups white flour | 2 Cups Masa Harina    |
| 1/2 Cup wheat germ | 1/2 Cup 3-Minute Oats |
| 1 Tablespoon sugar | 1 Tablespoon salt     |

Mix all dry ingredients thoroughly. Add 1 1/2 to 1-3/4 cups water. Mix with hands until well moistened but not sticky. Devide into four parts, roll out each quarter until 1/4 inch thick, place on cookie sheet (each part should cover 1/2 a cookie sheet). Bake in 350-degree oven for 30 minutes. Optional ingredients: sesame seed, seasoned salt, caraway seed or onion flakes. Score with a knife before baking if desired. Break into piec es as needed. Keeps indefinitely in air-tight, moisture-proof containers. Zip lock bags are good for carrying hardtack in a backpack.
