

"If You Build It, They Will Come"

Carl Kunath was driving back to San Angelo from the TSA spring convention at Fort McKavett with his wife Glenda. She's been attending TSA conventions since 1965, the last time a convention was held anywhere close to San Angelo. Carl asked for her impressions of the convention and her reply was thought provoking: "You guys used to talk about caves. I sat out there with you for three hours Friday night and all you talked about was GPS, digital cameras, and computer stuff. I didn't understand a word of what you said." Carl was inspired to write an interesting article that will appear in a future Texas Caver. He sent me a copy of the article, which in turn started my mental gears turning and inspired this article. I'm not copying or paraphrasing Carl's article other than borrowing Glenda's comment, which is a profound statement on the state of caving today.

Joe Giddens was probably the prime mover in starting the Maverick Grotto. He knew the ins and outs of how such things worked with the NSS. He wrote the first draft of the Constitution and we got our charter back quickly and we were off and running. Joe had a strong opinion about newsletters being the primary means of communications within a grotto and the glue that held it together. He had voiced this for years at DFW Grotto meetings so it should be expected he'd keep up the mantra in the new grotto. A successful grotto always has a timely newsletter with useful information for its membership. That alone can hold a grotto together. I didn't use quotes because I don't remember exactly how he said it but that's probably pretty close.

In 1986, there were three venues of communications within a grotto: Meetings, phone calls and the newsletter. You can say there were four if you include the occasional letter someone wrote and sent to a few friends. I recall a character named Al Rehfeldt showing up at a meeting a year or so after the grotto started, saying he didn't realize it was meeting time again but he got his newsletter the day before and that reminded him to make the meeting. That started a meeting discussion of newsletter timeliness and it turned out that was the reminder that triggered a lot of people to come to meetings. It was a pretty strong statement for the importance of newsletter timeliness. With few ex-

ceptions, the Maverick Bull has always been published and mailed in a timely fashion before the meeting. Meetings have always been well attended and I believe the newsletter has been a factor.

The quote attributed to the movie "Field of Dreams", "If you build it they will come" has always had a strong effect on me. It applies to a lot of situations in life but is particularly relevant to caving and grottos. You have to build it; it doesn't happen by itself. You have to build a newsletter, a grotto, a meeting, a convention, a website and even a caving trip. You have to communicate using all the venues at your disposal. Communicate, communicate, and communicate.

It's 2005 and we now have more ways to communicate with each other about caving. The newsletter is still important, as are meetings and the occasional phone call. We've added websites, e-mail and mailing lists to the ways we communicate. Mailing Lists like CaveTex, the Texas Caver list, Metroplex Cavers and our own Maverick Grotto list have become major factors in caver communication. Websites communicate what caving is all about and the non-caving public has the opportunity to share some of our experiences. Occasionally a wannabe caver looks at the website and attends a meeting. Sometimes they stay and join the community and sometimes they don't, but we've at least made the opportunity available to them.

The spring TSA convention at Fort McKavett was well attended because not only was it listed on a few website calendars and newsletters, it was hyped for months on the CaveTex list giving people plenty of time to plan their time to be there.

E-mail (including the lists) is probably the greatest thing that ever happened in the caving world. You can send an e-mail almost anyplace in the world and it's there within a few seconds. When I'm done with this article I'm going to e-mail it to Tammy for the newsletter. When she finishes the newsletter, she'll upload it to the website. She will then e-mail me that it's there ready to be converted into PDF format. I'll perform that task, upload the PDF, modify the member subscriber page then send an e-mail notification to the Maverick mailing list that it's ready for download. Processes that once took days are now done in hours if not minutes

Having the newsletter on the website has been useful, especially for far away members who can download the newsletter shortly after it's available and see it in color rather than having to wait for the US-Mail which is sometimes harsh on newsletters. The older newsletters have been popular with the caving public. Tammy's February 2005 newsletter has been downloaded 48 times now.

The website has set a new record for visitation this month. Recently 89 pictures from the Colorado Bend project were added and announced on the various mailing lists. The response has been so enthusiastic that we've already exceeded 1.5 GB (gigabytes – one billion characters) of download bandwidth this month. Last month we broke 1 GB for the first time because 100 old newsletters were added and announced. Bill Tucker's Phantom Springs pictures held the top download position until then.

Cowtown Grotto Members Take Action!

A seven story structure (not including the basement and sub-basement) located in an upper-end section of downtown Fort Worth was thought to have had several bats trapped in it. The Kress building had been used by the bats for decades without problems. But the building was now being refurbished and it appeared the contractor had inadvertently sealed the entry/exit for the colony forcing the bats to seek an alternate means of escape. Many volunteers came to help.

A big THANKS to the Cowtown Grotto members who assisted me in the rescue. It was a long week and the extra eyes searching saved many of the little guys. Roger Mercer located a "secret passage" in the building that I had over looked and saved lots of bats. Without their help we would have lost many more Mexican free tailed bats. I wish the contractor had called a few days earlier. The basements and sub-basement had rooms that had not been entered in probably 25 years or more, I am told by Amanda Lollar at BatWorld Sanctuary in Mineral Wells (our rescue centers headquarters) that this was the biggest bat rescue that she or all the other rescue centers in the U.S. have ever heard of in 25+ years of bat research, and rehab. work in the whole country. I used over 800 syringes hydrating them so they could make the ten mile journey to my place. Once there it had to be repeated

for all with new syringes plus a little food to keep up there blood sugar levels. This was done for fifty-four hours straight the first few days. Over 60 lbs. of bats were brought out. Thank God for the donations of medical sup-

plies. I used more this week than I would in ten years of rescues! We used over 4,000 syringes just rehydrating them. The rescue including meds, fluids, caging, gas, lost time at work and such ended costing us almost \$5,000. This was the largest (and most drawn out!) rescue the organization has had in 20+ years. We even called rehabers who

never worked with bats before and gave

them a crash course on bat medical protocol. Batworld Lonestar, Trinity River and the Sanctuary were completely overloaded and were waiting on the lawyers for the owners to make a donation to help cover costs. It would have cost \$10,000 or more if they had called a bat excluder in and they usually say "public health threat " and start killing bats. They have promised to help, we just hope they do. We have received a lot of positive attention about it from all over the U.S. and that always helps!

Survey and Exploration of Deep and Punkin Caves Resumes

In February 2005, the TCMA Deep Cave Survey Project was initiated in order to continue the exploration, survey, and resource assessment of the caves on the Preserve. Initially, the project will focus on the survey of the areas immediately adjacent to the preferred visitation route through Deep Cave so as to assess and potentially open those areas to future visitation. The cave can best be described as a 3dimensional maze in both breakdown and bedrock that requires a good deal of crawling and climbing. Surveys will be conducted according to a standard set of project guidelines so as to maintain quality control throughout the course of the project. Participants do not necessarily need to have prior survey experience but it is encouraged. Some portions of the cave require vertical rope experience but most areas do not. As the cave is quite complex, survey trips will be rather slow paced in order to allow for adequate exploration and sketching.

On March 19th, 2005, the Project held its first weekend trip to both Deep and Punkin Caves. Twelve cavers attended the weekend effort and surveyed a total of 415m (1360 feet). Deep Cave is presently 1849m (6066 feet) long and 91m (299 feet) deep. Punkin Cave is 44.7m (147 feet) deep and approximately 300m (1000 feet) long. The following is an abbreviated report of each team's efforts:

Deep Cave Team 1: Jerry Atkinson, Darla Bishop, John Brooks, and Philip Rywalder surveyed 112.4m (369 feet) in the Lost World (LW survey). The passage consisted of an extensive breakdown maze with sizeable rooms separated by nasty crawls. The team attempted to follow good airflow but

all such leads ended in tight squeezes that would need enlarging. The surveyed area underlies the Swiss Cheese Corridor and Bat Room. Numerous leads remain. Interesting monocrystalline spar stalagmites resembling pagodas were noted and animal claw scratches were observed on broken draperies.

Deep Cave Team 2: Marvin Miller, Ed Goff, Linda Palit, and Joe Ranzau surveyed 123.8m (406 feet) in the Miller Time Room area (CF survey). The team completed the survey of the Miller Time Room and extended the breakdown maze northward to connect into the Helictite Room. They then continued the survey to the southwest along the rift that parallels the corridor leading to the Crystal Waterfall area. The breakdown maze continues with numerous leads and airflow.

Punkin Cave Team 1: Pete Lindsley, Jim Kennedy, Clark Giles, and John Crosthwait surveyed 178.4m (585 feet) from the entrance of the cave down through the rift passage developed at the south end of the entrance room (R survey). At the bottom of the steep rift passage, the team found a large, 11m (35 feet) wide by 20m (65 feet) long, flat ceiling room averaging 2m (6 feet) high (Mortuary Room). Goat bones were observed in the room. Numerous leads with good airflow remain to be surveyed. A new route was explored back to the entrance room which also remains to be surveyed.

A large, Barred Owl was seen in the entrance room and several Eastern Pipistrelles were observed in the rift passage.


Future Efforts: A large part of the known caves remain to be surveyed, and based on the exploration to date, much remains to be discovered. Both caves contain unique speleothems and geologic features which need to be documented and assessed for potential impact due to visitation. Biological and photo documentation studies have begun, but much work remains. Individuals interested in participating in the Project or that have questions should contact Jerry Atkinson via email or by phone. Future trips are scheduled for every two to three months and will be announced on CaveTex.




Deep Cave drapery

Lodging Options for Punkin and Deep

Having just returned from a wonderful weekend at the Punkin and Deep Cave property, I thought I would give a limited trip report on lodging accommodations for future caver visits to the property. Wanting to bring my wife and children along on the trip, I was kindly informed by my wife that we have a travel trailer and she was not going camping in the rain and heat if there was any other option.

After a web search, e-mails to Geary, and phone calls to local residents, I found the closest accommodations to the property. The old store in Carta Valley has been turned into the headquarters for Triple CCC - Hunting, Fishing & Exotics. Behind the store, they have full hook-ups, water, electric, and sewer, for three or four RVs. We have a 27 foot travel trailer and had no problem parking on the hook-up outside of the fence. The pads are level, but there is grass only on the ones inside the fence. The rate was very reasonable at \$10/night, but I do not know if they will continue with that low rate since this first trip was kind of a neighborly gesture. To secure a spot, we first called Charles Hand at (210) 849-7996 and explained that we were to work at the Punkin and Deep Cave property over the weekend. He then in turn called the camp hostess (Fonda at 813-240-4830), yes that is a Florida area code, to let them know we were coming. Hunters have first priority, but they only have a few scheduled until December. Fonda and her husband live in the fifth wheel in the back where the RVs are parked.

The camp headquarters are also available for rent, although the prices for that were not discussed. The headquarters are in the old store and have one bathroom, living room (with fireplace), two bedrooms with a queen bed and two bunk beds, and a quasi-sleeping area with three double beds. The front area of the headquarters has a full kitchen, a large family style dining area (probably can sit 20), and a billiard room.


The web site for the camp headquarters is www. Triple-CCC.com which has some pictures of the accommodations and some of the hunting kills. Fonda said that when staying in the headquarters, they can do the cooking or you can do the cooking. I am sure there are different prices for each. There is no air conditioning in the lodge, but all the rooms have ceiling fans. When climbing out of Deep Cave, it is nice to know a good shower is waiting at the headquarters.

The hunting lodge headquarters is across the highway (277) from the ranch road that goes to the Punkin and Deep Cave property. So the only

drawback is the property is ten miles (30 minutes) from the headquarters. Our experience with everyone at Triple-CCC was great and they are looking forward to additional income from visitors to the Punkin and Deep Cave property.


